Exercise 1: Identify Simile and Metaphor

Read the following lines and determine whether each comparison is a simile or a metaphor.

The night was as dark as coal.
Time is a thief, silently stealing moments from our lives.
Her laughter is like music to my ears.
The waves danced on the shore like joyful children.

Exercise 2: Recognize Alliteration and Assonance

Identify whether the given lines contain alliteration or assonance.

Silken, sad, uncertain rustling of each purple curtain.
The rain in Spain falls mainly on the plain.
The cat sat on the mat, staring at the fat rat.
A fleet of sleek sheep sleep in the meadow.

Exercise 3: Find Imagery

Determine if the lines evoke vivid images through sensory language.

The scent of freshly baked bread wafted through the air.
The crimson sunset painted the sky with hues of fire.
The soft, velvety petals of the rose invited a gentle touch.
The city skyline glittered like a field of stars.

Exercise 4: Identify Personification

Decide if the lines attribute human qualities to non-human entities.

Answers

Exercise 1: Simile and Metaphor

Simile

Explanation: "as dark as coal" is a comparison using "as."

Metaphor

Explanation: "Time is a thief" directly compares time to a thief without using "like" or "as."

Simile

Explanation: "Her laughter is like music" uses "like" for the comparison.

Simile

Explanation: "The waves danced on the shore like joyful children" uses "like" for the comparison.

Exercise 2: Alliteration and Assonance

Alliteration

Explanation: "Silken, sad, uncertain" contains repeated initial consonant sounds.

Alliteration

Explanation: "rain in Spain falls mainly" has repeated initial "s" sounds.

Alliteration

Explanation: "cat sat on the mat" contains repeated initial "s" sounds.

Assonance

Explanation: "fleet of sleek sheep sleep" has repeated vowel sounds within words.

Exercise 3: Imagery

Imagery

Explanation: "scent of freshly-baked bread" appeals to the sense of smell.

Imagery

Explanation: "crimson sunset painted the sky" creates a vivid visual image.

Imagery

Explanation: "soft, velvety petals of the rose" appeals to touch.

Imagery

Explanation: "city skyline glittered like a field of stars" creates a visual image.

Exercise 4: Personification

Personification

Explanation: "Wind whispered secrets" attributes human qualities (whispering secrets) to the wind.

Personification

Explanation: "sun smiled down" gives human characteristics to the sun.

Personification

Explanation: "Old book on the shelf begged" suggests the book has human-like desires.

Personification

Explanation: "river danced its way through the valley" gives the river human-like movement.

Exercise 5: Symbolism

Symbolism

Explanation: "Dove is a symbol of peace" represents peace and harmony.

Symbolism

Explanation: "broken mirror reflected shattered dreams" symbolizes broken dreams.

Symbolism

Explanation: "Oak tree stands for strength" represents strength and resilience.

Symbolism

Explanation: "journey through the desert symbolizes life's challenges" represents life's challenges.

Exercise 6: Onomatopoeia

Onomatopoeia

Explanation: "Bees buzzed" uses a word that imitates the sound it represents.

Onomatopoeia

Explanation: "Thunder roared" imitates the sound of thunder.

Onomatopoeia

Explanation: "crackling fire" imitates the sound of a crackling fire.

Onomatopoeia

Explanation: "door creaked" imitates the sound of a creaking door.
